Harrisburg may soon join the ranks of cities having Civil War Round Tables.

A meeting to form one of the discussion groups is scheduled to be held at 2:30 p.m. Sunday at the home of John J. Cobaugh, 2511 Duke St.

Any resident of the Harrisburg area who likes to study and talk about the Civil War is invited to take part in the formation of a permanent group at his home Sunday, Cobaugh said.

The first Round Table was begun by a handful of men in a Chicago bookshop in 1940. Since that time the movement has grown to 678 groups with a total membership of about 5,200. Each Round Table is autonomous. The nearest group to Harrisburg is in Gettysburg.


